Last Friday they learnt how to code machines, Robots called Edisons, and portable computers called Microbits. The three classes were split into two groups.

The first group built a game of Rock Paper Scissors on the Microbits. Tamariki competed for the "World Championship" of Rock Paper Scissors, where Zach and Tun Soe were crowned the winners. The tamariki had great fun, there was a lot of cheering! Behind all the fun, they were learning about using random numbers.

The second group wrote code for an Edison robot to navigate a maze. Tamariki solved the problem by breaking it into two parts. First, they wrote code to find a line and then they got the robot to follow the line until the end of the maze. Both groups learned how to use coding to control physical devices which is an advanced outcome.

We are so grateful to the Code Club crew for sharing their expertise with us and leading this learning for us.

Students with cellphones

A change is required in the way we manage cellphones at school due to our rangatahi (young people) misusing them.

In the past we've trusted that children will have them turned off and not used at school. This year I am sad to report there have been a number of occasions when children have been caught videoing and taking photos of children (at times without their permission) and sharing them on social media and within group chats. There have also been many times we have become aware of rangitahi using their phones in the bathrooms, not just in break times but during class time as well.

From Monday, our new rule is that if a student brings a phone to school they must hand it to their teacher so it can be locked away until the end of the school day.

If a student is observed with a phone during the school day, they will be instructed to hand it over to the Principal. It will be returned to them once contact has been made with their whānau.

We know some of our young people won't be happy about this new rule but we suspect they are likely to be one of the students who secretly uses their phone during the school day.


