Kia ora e te whānau,

Later this afternoon, we will be announcing our 2025 House Leaders. Before this time, I want to acknowledge the 29 brave Year 7-8 students who put themselves forward for these roles.

Applying to be a House Leader is no small thing—it takes courage to step up, put yourself out there, and show a willingness to lead. Many of our rangatahi (young people) shared how they had desired this role since they were little or how they've wanted to follow in the footsteps of their older siblings, showing just how important this position is to them and the mana that comes with it. The kaiako and I were impressed by the honesty in the applications. Many recognised that leadership comes with challenges, such as speaking at their Waka Hui and being a role model for others. Some even bravely acknowledged that in previous years, they may not have always set the best example in the playground or in the way they showed respect to teachers, but how they wanted to be different this year and expressed their commitment to making positive changes, whether or not they were selected.

With 29 applicants and only eight positions—two leaders for each house—we know that today's announcement will bring both excitement and disappointment for our young people. For those who aren't chosen this time, we know the disappointment will be hard to shake. Which is natural to feel that way when you put your heart into something. This is why we intentionally share the announcement on a Friday afternoon-to give our tamariki the weekend to process their emotions and move past this immediate feeling of loss.

We also recognise that whanau will feel the disappointment too. As parents and caregivers, you see exactly how wonderful your child is, and it's hard to watch them miss out on something they really wanted. We want to acknowledge the role you'll play in supporting them through this-thank you. We know you'll be carrying a lot of the emotional load, and we want you to know we're here too. Our kaiako and staff will continue to encourage and uplift them next week and beyond.

And remember, not being named a House Leader today doesn't mean their leadership journey ends here. There will be many opportunities throughout the year to step up—whether it's supporting younger students, leading a school event, representing

their house in competitions, or showing kindness and responsibility in their everyday actions. Leadership isn't just about a title; it's about how you show up for others. Ka mau te wehi-what an inspiring group of rangatahi!

Strengthening Literacy Learning at Kahurangi

Over the past two days, our kaiako have taken part in **Structured Literacy** training—an evidence-based approach to teaching reading and writing. This learning helps us better understand how tamariki develop literacy skills and the most effective strategies to support them. Key areas covered included:

- ☑ How memory and learning work to make knowledge "stick"
- The importance of explicit instruction—breaking skills into clear, manageable steps
- ☑ Key principles of Structured Literacy to build strong foundations for all learners

On page 3, you'll see that some of our tamariki's achievement results have declined over the last couple of years which is a serious concern for us. While our kaiako and akonga are working hard, teaching and learning is complex, and many factors influence tamariki's progress. Like most kura across Aotearoa, we face challenges to get on top of this, but we (along with the government) are committed to doing everything we can to turn this around for our tamariki.

These Teacher Only Days were just the start—our kaiako will continue this learning with another full-day course over the next two weeks (covered by relievers) and fortnightly PLD sessions to embed these practices. We share this so you know our investment in this learning goes beyond Teacher Only Days.


Waka Rimu Whā explored the month of Ramadan, learning about its significance for our Muslim tamariki. They then did a fantastic job designing and creating their own mosque.






Our 2022-2024 literacy data shows a decline in reading and writing achievement, with more åkonga falling 'Below' expectations and literacy targets for 2024 not met. In 2025, we will prioritise strengthening early literacy foundations, providing targeted support for priority learners, lifting overall literacy achievement, and ensuring consistency through structured assessment and data-driven teaching.

MATHEMATICS ACHIEVEMENT



In 2025, we will strengthen mathematics teaching by implementing the Maths - No Problem! approach to provide a more structured, researchbacked foundation, Our focus will be on enhancing teacher capability, providing targeted support for priority learners, and fostering problem-solving and extension opportunities to lift achievement across all ākonga.















Maths -No Problem!



We're looking forward to introducing Maths - No Problem! across all classes this year which is a new approach specifically designed to strengthen tamariki's maths skills and boost achievement.

With the introduction of the revised Mathematics Curriculum last year, our entire team has been working hard to unpack the changes and ensure a smooth transition in 2025.

This approach was originally developed in the UK and based on Singapore's successful maths model. Maths - No Problem! follows a mastery approach, providing a structured, sequenced learning progression where all tamariki can thrive.

Starting Monday 10 March, all tamariki will be learning in their year groups (e.g. year 5's in one class), meaning some may move to a different teacher for maths. This shift allows for more explicit teaching, ensuring tamariki have the time and support to master each concept before moving on.

All of our teachers—including part-time staff—have taken part in professional development to prepare for this shift. However, as with any new programme, it will take time for us to become fully confident with this approach. The programme includes:

- ☑ Hands-on equipment
- ✓ Working with a maths buddy
- Textbooks and workbooks (with some variations for Year 0/1)
- ☑ Revisiting key concepts at deeper levels
