I hope this pānui finds you all well. We've had a **really positive start** to the term — the children have come back refreshed, settled guickly into their learning, and are generally showing great attention and focus in class, which I'm sure you'll be pleased to hear.

As the weather begins to cool, a reminder to please send your tamariki with warm clothes and a jacket each day. Unless it's raining or bitterly cold, we do our best to get tamariki outside at break times for some fresh air and movement.

Now for some wonderful news - times two!

I'm absolutely thrilled to share that Kahurangi School has been successful in securing a \$7,500 grant from One Foundation to go towards purchasing the bicycle pump track that has been on loan to us — and absolutely loved by our tamariki. We are completely and utterly grateful for their generous support.

After receiving the grant, we reached out to EkeRua ReBicycle to see if we could purchase just half of the track, as the full cost was \$15,000 (and originally cost \$55,000 when brand new a few years ago). We knew that even owning part of it would continue to bring a huge amount of joy and benefit to our students. But in a wonderful turn of events, EkeRua ReBicycle offered to sell us the entire track for the amount we had received. This means the pump track is now officially ours — a permanent fixture here at Kahurangi! We're so grateful to EkeRua ReBicycle for their incredible generosity and their belief in the value of keeping this taonga in our community.

We're so grateful to both the funders and to EkeRua ReBicycle for their incredible generosity. Our tamariki will continue to benefit from this taonga for years to come - increasing confidence, coordination, and connection with others as they ride.

A quick reminder that whanau are always encouraged to connect with teachers when needed. While it can be tricky for teachers to chat during the school day (9am-3pm), before and after school are ideal times to have a korero. If possible, kanohi ki te kanohi (face-to-face) is always more effective than email and helps keep communication warm and clear.

We're looking forward to a positive term ahead — one filled with learning, connection, and plenty of opportunities to support our rangatahi to thrive here at Kahurangi.

Duffy Books in Homes Programme

We're lucky to be one of only two schools in Wellington City and the Southern Suburbs involved in the Duffy Books in Homes programme – a privilege not all schools have. We choose to be part of it because we believe in the power of books and the right of every child to have access to them, regardless of

their circumstances.

Each year, every child at our kura receives up to eight brandnew books to take home, treasure, and enjoy with their whānau. It's a significant extra cost to the school, but one we gladly carry as part of our commitment to equity and fostering a love of reading. We know not all families can afford books, and this is one meaningful way we can help bridge that gap.

Ngā mihi to all the sponsors behind Duffy, and a big thank you to our Board for their ongoing support in helping every child at Kahurangi build a library of their own.















We're trying something new to boost attendance!

One of our school's strategic goals is to create an inclusive and equitable kura where all tamariki feel safe, valued, and are attending regularly. We're doing a lot across the school to make this a reality for every child.

A key focus this term is attendance. Despite our efforts to highlight its importance, a large number of tamariki are still not attending school regularly (defined as less than 90% attendance). We absolutely understand that genuine illness can't be helped — and we're not encouraging anyone unwell to come to school – but we also see times where children are staying home because they're 'sick of school', 'don't feel like it', or avoiding something that feels hard.

This term, we've introduced a new strategy to encourage more consistent attendance — the 100% Club. Each class is running its own version, and tamariki can join simply by being at school every day that week. Everyone in the club goes into a class draw to win a small treat.

It's a simple idea we hope will build something bigger: a stronger sense of consistency, pride, and achievement around turning up every day.

We'd love for whanau to support this kaupapa by reinforcing the importance of daily attendance (when you're not sick) at home.

In the coming weeks, I'll be reaching out to whānau of students whose



attendance is irregular and concerning. My goal is for us to work with you to turn things around - but of course, I also welcome you getting in touch first.
