Important message from the **Board**

You may have heard about the Government passing a bill that removes the obligation for school boards to give effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. We know this change may raise questions about our school's direction. At our 4 November 2025 Board

meeting, which was the same day that the change was <u>publicised</u>, we discussed how we would respond as the governing body.

We unanimously decided that we will continue to strive to give effect to Te Tiriti and to implement our Strategic Goal 2: Te Ao Māori.

We want you to know that regardless of this imminent legislative change, the Board remains committed to Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Our Strategic Plan was developed through consultation with you, our community, who endorsed this goal because it reflects our shared values and our vision for a successful, inclusive school in Aotearoa. Upholding our commitment to honouring Te Tiriti o Waitangi has always been fundamental to who we are as a kura, and we do not see that changing.

We also want to acknowledge the work of the Ropū Whānau Māori. We look forward to strengthening our relationship and taking guidance on where the board and staff can best support our tamariki.

We remain dedicated to our vision: Whāia te iti kahurangi, ke te tūohu koe me he amauna teitai - Pursue that which is precious, and do not be deterred by anything less than a lofty mountain.
