A Year of Major Change and Steady Progress

Like every primary school across the motu, we've been navigating massive curriculum changes. Structured Literacy and Structured Maths have continued to be embedded across our kura, and our kaiako have been building their confidence with these approaches while also getting to grips with the refreshed English and Maths curriculum. I'm incredibly proud of how hard our leaders and teachers have worked, investing huge amounts of time into professional development so they were ready for these shifts. Even when Ministry guidance arrived in pieces, the team stayed

focussed on doing what is best for your tamariki. Much of this mahi happens quietly, and unless you're in classrooms or our meetings, you won't see the planning, reading, trialling and adjusting, but it has been significant.

As new information has rolled out, we've been refining our assessment systems too.

We know whānau might still feel a bit out of the loop. To be honest, it has been almost impossible to keep everyone fully informed because the shifts have been continuous and, at times, have changed again soon after. We often haven't had the full picture ourselves, and with regular updates still arriving, we've known it hasn't been the right time to introduce whānau to the new direction.

What we do know is that further changes are expected in 2026, so next year may feel similar in terms of adjustment. One shift that will be especially noticeable is the change

in how we report to parents. Our hope is that 2026 brings more certainty so we can bring

whānau along with us in a clearer, more confident way.

Life and Learning Across Our Kura

When we think back over the year, the energy across our kura has been unmistakable. Whether it was Movin'March, swimming, cross country or the many sports and activities our tamariki took part in, you could feel their motivation, kindness and the way they cheer one another on. It sets the tone for everything else.

That same energy has been present in classrooms. Our tamariki have been curious, engaged and willing to try new things across all areas of learning. They've also adjusted incredibly well to the ongoing shifts in Structured Literacy and Structured Maths. These programmes have asked a lot of them, but they've taken the changes in their stride and grown in confidence as the year has unfolded.

We've also celebrated the cultures and identities that make our kura what it is. These moments are always special, especially when you see tamariki stand a little taller as their language, culture or stories are shared. It's a powerful reminder of how important belonging is.

And our EOTC Step Up programme for Years 4 to 8 was another standout. There is a huge amount of unseen work behind the planning and logistics of each outing, but the learning and confidence it builds for our tamariki make every bit of that mahi worthwhile.













Our Whānau and Community

Across the year we welcomed many new learners and their whānau. Our tamariki included them so naturally, which says a lot about who they are and the culture we've built together.

And to all our whanau who have helped in ways big and small, thank you. The visible things like supporting sports teams, coaching, managing, lifting boxes at events, donating kai or covering Breakfast Club are noticed and appreciated. But it's also the invisible mahi that makes such a difference... the consistent effort to support good attendance, the bedtime reading, the guiet conversations at home that back up our expectations at school, the encouragement on the tough mornings, the trust you place in us, and the way so many of you stay aligned with our messaging. All of that matters. Probably more than you realise. We see it, we feel it, and we're genuinely grateful.

A Dedicated Board and an Incredible Staff

Our Board has provided calm, thoughtful governance in a year of curriculum change, legislative updates, elections and strategic planning. Thank you to Jane, Mike, Alison, and to our newest members Carissa, Sam and Brynne, for leading with such care and purpose. A special acknowledgement also to our outgoing members Iraia, Angela and Robyn, whose contributions over their time on the Board were deeply valued.

Across our staff, there is so much to be grateful for. Our leadership team of Ruth, Claire and Natalie have each brought strength, steadiness and care to their multiple roles, guiding children, teachers and teams through a full and fast-moving year. To our classroom teachers Emma B, Melody, Maddie, Brynne, Emma T, Claire, Anika, Grant, Emma M, Sarah, Anna and Nicholas, thank you for the commitment, calmness and consistency you bring to your tamariki every day.
